

You must supply your own cart and you must present to the pro-shop a certificate proving that you have liability insurance on your golf cart. We will make a copy and keep on file so you will only have to do that the first time you play. This year you are not required to be with a member, but you are still responsible for following the rules of the course. A rule book may be obtained in the pro-shop. Yes, that's us - the First Responders now known as Emergency Medical Responders or EMRs!!

We have incorporated and are almost ready to start up. By-laws have been written, we have a Memorandum of Understanding with our Homeowner's Association Board, have opened our business bank account and have receive the necessary State approval to conduct fund raising activities.

To that end, we must ask for your financial support. Our startup expenses include liability insurance, hiring a medical director, connecting with the 911 system and all sorts of Florida fees for various required applications to start a not for profit corporation, not to mention the usual office supplies.

In the next few weeks, you will receive a letter from us asking for funds as they become more of a necessity. We hope that you can be as generous as possible so that we can get this program going.

We already have about 40 folks who have volunteered to be EMRs or Traffic Control plus others who have said they would be part of the auxiliary section of our organization. We really want to bring back this needed service to all of High Point. You know that time is often crucial in a medical emergency and we want to provide the emergency care you might need. Our response time will be as close to or the same as what you had with the previous first responder program and we want to start soon!!

You need to know that the HPCPO, Inc, The Hernando High Point Volunteer Fire Department (now disbanded) and HHP EMR Inc. are all not for profit corporations and by federal IRS law, Section 501c(3) of the Internal Revenue Code cannot give money to each other. We are working closely with the HPCPO, Inc. To see if there is any other route open in the future to share expenses in order to provide this needed service.

Trash Pick-up News

We would like to remind everyone of the requirements for <u>lawn</u> and garden waste pickup. We are so fortunate to have this service provided every week now, and we certainly want to help the fellows who work so hard, especially in this heat, to make their jobs just a little easier. If you have piles of branches, palm fronds, etc. to be picked up, please be considerate and tie these things in a bundle so it only takes one "grab" for the refuse worker to pick it up and throw it in the truck. If all of your lawn waste is in a can, there is no need to bag or bundle it.

Again, we would also like you to know about a service for people with disabilities called "*Back Door Service.*" If you are disabled and have difficulty getting your trash to the curb, waste pick-up personnel will bring your trash receptacles to the truck and return them to your carport, or wherever you store them.

DID YOU KNOW?

From time to time, as space allows, we like to include in this newsletter some helpful reminders about subjects that often come to our attention as we deal with homeowners and their concerns. So, here goes, in no particular order:

Did you know

- All High Point roads are the property of Hernando County and all state and local laws must be obeyed when driving on them.
- The speed limit on ALL roads in High Point is 30 mph. We realize that High Point Blvd may appear to have been designed as a race track, but such is not the case.
- By special permit from the County Board of Directors, High Point residents are allowed to drive golf carts on our roads, but NOT after dark (even if you have headlights) and NOT by anyone under the age of 14. We ask that when traversing the Golf Club/Community Center parking lot you use the designated Golf Cart Lane rather than cutting through the parking lot. This is for your safety and that of those who may be walking across the lot.
- Any disturbances that can not be settled amicably between High Point neighbors, or concerns about suspicious circumstances should be reported at the *time of the incident* to the Hernando County Sheriff's office. Your Homeowner's Association has no authority in such matters. Coming into the office on Monday morning to report something you observed at 2 am on Saturday may allow you to vent about something that has upset you, but it won't go very far to solve your problem.
- There is NO SOLICITING allowed in High Point. If you are approached by someone going door to door please call the office, but have as much information as you can about the person who has approached you. You don't need to have a confrontation with the person. Get a business card if possible, or see if there is a phone number on the side of their vehicle. That way we can call the business and let the owners know that they are not allowed to go door to door in High Point.
- Requests for Yard Sales must be received in the office by noon on Wednesday before the weekend you plan on having your sale. That allows us to give you the visibility of having your sale on the weekly list that is handed out at the information booth and also posted on our High Point TV.
- Notary and fax services are available at the office for your convenience for a nominal fee.
- The email list of newsletter subscribers has gone the way of the old website (not recoverable) but High Point Matters is now included in our new High Point Website (in living color!) There is also a link on that page for you to enter your email address and we will be using that feature again in the near future.














SCAM ALERT!!!

It seems there is never a shortage of people who are devising clever schemes to separate us from our hard earned cash. Sadly, senior citizens often seem to be the most vulnerable to these criminals. We were raised in a time when it seems that people were more honest and ethical and con men were few. Times have changed to be sure and now anyone with a computer and a cell phone can easily prey on unsuspecting, honest folk.

In our latest billing, Withlacoochee River Electric (WREC) included an insert warning consumers of a common scam that is being used against their customers. It has also been used to call customers of numerous other businesses. In case you missed the warning from Withlacoochee, we are going to touch on some highlights that we should all keep in mind.

Scammers may use e-mail or "Caller ID Spoofing" to make contact. This latter can seem legitimate because caller ID will falsely show a recognizable area code (in this case "352") so as not to rouse suspicions as to the source of the call. Their "modus operandi" is to impersonate a Withlacoochee Co-op employee and demand immediate payment of a bill by credit or debit card, money order or Green Dot Money Pac. They then threaten disconnection if not paid.

Withlacoochee Electric wants us to know that **they will never call and demand immediate payment over the phone!** If you think you have received one of these calls, hang up and call WREC right away at 352-596-4000. They are working with local, state and federal authorities to protect their members against scams like these.

If someone should come to your home claiming to represent WREC, remember the following:

- Every WREC employee displays a photo ID badge identifying him or her by name, employee number and office to which assigned..
- In almost all cases, employees will be driving vehicles that are clearly marked with the WREC logo.
- All WREC line technicians, meter readers and staking engineers wear a shirt with the WREC logo and their names prominently displayed.



We hope the foregoing information will help you to easily determine whether the contact you receive is legitimate or not. These same tactics may be used by people falsely claiming to represent other businesses as well, so beware!

Landscaping Tips

"Bedding Plants, Herbs, Vegetables, Poinsettias and Mums, Ornamental Plants, Palms, Lawn Fertilizing, and Gardening Help"

"Tickle the earth with a hoe, it will laugh a Harvest." - Mary Cantell

According to the University of Florida Service Extension, during these hottest days of summer limit planting bedding plants to heat tolerant **Coleus, Kalanchoe**, and **Vinca**. Also, remove spent blooms, cut back, and fertilize flowering annuals and perennials to extend the flowering season into the fall months. Some of the **Herbs** that can be planted from plants (not seeds) are Ginger, Tarragon, Rosemary and Bay Laurel. For more information: *Herbs in the Florida Garden:* <u>http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/VH020</u>

Vegetables – Cool season crops like Onion and Collards can be planted now. We will start planting Lettuce, Cabbage, and Celery in September, so get your fall **Vegetable Garden** prepared this month. Go to: *Florida Vegetable Guide http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/pdffiles/VH/VH02100.pdf*

Poinsettias and Mums – It's time before the end of the month of August to pinch back Poinsettias and Mums to allow time for buds to form for winter bloom. See: *Poinsettias at a Glance:* http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/ep349

Ornamental Plants – With all the leaching rains and rapid growth, a nutrient deficiency may be present in some of our ornamental plants. It may be a good time to fertilize your plants and remember to follow fertilizer application instructions carefully. Go to: *Fertilization and Irrigation Needs for Florida Lawns and Landscapes*: http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/ep310

Palms – If the older/bottom fronds of your **Palms** are turning yellow on the outside of the fronds; it may indicate a **magnesium**(mg) or **potassium**(k) deficiency. It is important to diagnose the right nutrient deficiency as well as the soil pH to provide the correct treatment. We usually use **Dolomite** (calcium magnesium carbonate) or **Epsom Salt** (magnesium sulfate)for magnesium and **Pot Ash** (potassium carbonate) for potassium treatment to the soil. It is very important to read the following before any treatments are applied:*Magnesium Deficiency in Palms*: <u>http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/EP266</u>

Lawns – August is a good time to apply a controlled-release nitrogen fertilizer to St. Augustine/Floratam and Zoysia lawns. Make sure the fertilizer specifically states that it contains a reasonable percentage of "Time-Released" nitrogen and again follow label application instructions carefully. Remember the first of the three numbers on the bag is the percentage of Nitrogen. See: *General Recommendations for Fertilization of Turfgrass on Florida Soils*: http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/LH014

Fire Safety - Patriotism - Pride

Recently my wife and I had the unfortunate experience of a direct hit to our electric service by lightning resulting in a situation worth discussing. Over the last few years there have been several comments by our guests as to "why do you keep a fire extinguisher in your bedroom?" On 6/17/15 when lightning struck, we both went to check our breaker panel located in the spare bedroom (next to ours). Upon being entered, the panel exploded with flames shooting everywhere. Mary Sue took one step backwards, grabbed the extinguisher from our bedroom, handed it to me and retreated to the kitchen to call 911 while I knocked the fire down twice and held position until Hernando Fire and Rescue arrived, opened the walls (3!) to quell interior fires and our home was saved! If not for our presence, the crucial position of a good "ABC" rated fire extinguisher and the quick response of HCF&R we would not have a home today. Truly, we had an enormous amount of luck and were blessed that day. The point of this article is: Do you have a good extinguisher, or better yet, extinguishers? Do you know how to use them? Are they placed where they are readily available? If you answered "no" to <u>any</u> of these questions, correct the situation immediately. Head for Lowe's, Home Depot, Walmart, wherever, and be prepared. The home or life you save could be your own!

Were you able to attend our 4th of July Parade? Though small, it was very colorful and a lot of patriotism was exhibited. The work that Sylvia Pistorius, Jim Stuck and others put into this event is to be applauded. I'm a bit mystified as to why more folks don't get involved and excited about this, the <u>only</u> Independence Day Parade in Hernando County. The community from which we moved in Pennsylvania had a population of 980 (in borough). Our volunteer fire company served our borough and five adjacent townships and held a 10 day Carnival, always including the 4th of July. Our parades were usually between 3 and 5 miles long ("no holes") and drew crowds of 10,000 to 14,000! Hernando County needs a double dose of patriotism. High Point should be crowded with folks celebrating our Country, our freedoms and our blessings. Thank you to those who were here and proud to show it!
